AN INTERVIEW WITH JULIETA GRANADA

Q. Congratulations. Was it an easier time because you did get off to a fast start and take the pressure off?

JULIETA GRANADA: Yes, definitely. That really helped a lot. I was striking it good, and I was putting good, and I wasn't too worried about, you know, how I was hitting it and how I was putting it. So it calmed me down and it got me to a good start.

Q. Now, tomorrow, everybody is nervous, I suppose, because everybody starts even. How do you approach tomorrow?

JULIETA GRANADA: I don't know. We have to wait and see. I think you have got to be aggressive. You have got to go for everything, and then, you know, try to make some putts here and there. Your putting definitely has to be on tomorrow if you want to get a million.

Q. Would it matter whether you are in the first group, middle, or the last group?

JULIETA GRANADA: Not really. I am just happy to be there. It's a cool experience. Such a good feeling, such a great course, and I'm just happy to be there. And tomorrow I just need a hundred percent, and I'll be happy with the result, no matter what.

Q. People would expect a veteran to have an advantage, somebody who has won before. What's your thoughts on that?

JULIETA GRANADA: I don't know, because this format is new to everyone. Nobody played it before, so I think kind of everybody was in the same boat. Nobody knew what to expect, what to do. And I don't know, I was happy. I was happy I'm going to play tomorrow.

Q. Do you suppose there is any advantage to having not faced a whole lot of pressure the first couple of days? Maybe it isn't so draining when you come off the course. Feel a little pressure tomorrow?

JULIETA GRANADA: No. The last three holes are nerve-racking. You just want to go for the middle of the green and just two-putt. But, no, still same amount of pressure. I mean, it's the same thing.

Q. Are there enough leader boards out there? Are you watching to see how you stand continuously, or did you not worry about that so much today, but maybe tomorrow, because you kind of need to know where you stand?

JULIETA GRANADA: No, today I try not to look at the leader board. I think I looked on 7, and then I didn't look until 18. I was just trying to play my game because then, okay, who is going to make it; who is not going to make it, and you get into that whole game. So I try not to look at it, but tomorrow, definitely, you have to know where you are at.

Q. It's not a major championship, but it's not a normal event either. Can you talk about what makes this event -- what would make winning it special?

JULIETA GRANADA: The million bucks would be nice. That's enough for me. This field is the strongest field ever. So it's just a great event, and the million definitely makes it more exciting for everyone

Q. What does it mean to be one of the only rookies in this final 8?

JULIETA GRANADA: It's cool. I played with Ai today, and we did try to push each other and we played great. So it's just, you know, cool to me, no matter whether I'm a rookie or a veteran.

Q. What's the currency in Paraguay? We have the dollar. What is the currency in Paraguay?

JULIETA GRANADA: Guarani.

Q. Is that about 10 million?

JULIETA GRANADA: No, more than that. I think it's a hundred million. I don't know.

Q. A lot.

JULIETA GRANADA: Don't get me on that.

Q. Thank you.
