THE MODERATOR: Jill McGill, third round, 15-under, you are right there.

JILL MCGILL: I'm pleased going into tomorrow, I feel like I've played good golf for three days. I have been calm on the golf course, and had a good time enjoying it and so there is nothing to do but look forward to having a fun day tomorrow.

Q. (Inaudible)?

JILL MCGILL: 3, I hit a 5-iron to pin-high right, just off it, and I basically short sided myself and didn't get up and down. I hit my chip to about 15 feet and left it short.

5, I hit driver, 6-iron just short, right of the green. I hit my approach to a couple of inches for a birdie.

7, I haven't quite figured out how to play that hole yet because I only had about 47 yards to the pin right over that bunker and it was a little bit of a tough shot hit it to the back of the green and 3-putted.

And 10, I hit a 3-wood, pitching wedge to 15 feet.

15, I hit a 7-iron to 30 feet.

And 18, I hit a 5-iron to about 20 feet, I think, 2-putted.

I did get to may take my shoes off during the round and stepped into the correct.

Q. (Inaudible)?

JILL MCGILL: Man, it felt good, too. It was so hot. Thank God that water is clean. Man, that was the first string I think I pulled in three days. I don't know what my problem was, but apparently I was having issues on the tee box. I got over there. Luckily I had some short of shot where I could advance it and still hit the green in regulation. So I think the water was almost knee deep, I don't know.

Q. (Inaudible)?

JILL MCGILL: The ball was on the bank, yes. It was just a matter of being able to get an angle where I could get enough on it and I hit a sand wedge, really gripped down pretty far on the sand wedge, and just hacked it out, and came out -- it's kind of one where you close your eyes a little bit when you hit it.

It came out nicely because I only had, I don't know, I hit a 5-iron down there. Had it have been on line it would have been on the green.

Q. (Inaudible)?

JILL MCGILL: Probably 60 yards. Yes, 60, something like that. Yes.

Q. (Inaudible)?

JILL MCGILL: Well, Grace is a great player and I would expect her to go out and have a solid round of golf. I wouldn't expect anything less of anybody else on the leaderboard. I mean, it's pretty jammed up from what I saw. I hadn't seen the leaderboard until 18. And to have, you know, a handful of people within a couple shots of the lead, it's anybody's ball game. They just have to go out there and if it's your day it's your day. I felt as though today I was trying to put myself in good position, and I had just had in between yardages all day long which was little bit frustrating. Yesterday, everything was clicking. You just have days like that. Today it was a little bit more of a struggle. Hopefully, I will have a day tomorrow -- every other day is what I'm planning on.

Q. (Inaudible)?

JILL MCGILL: Maybe. I maybe would have gotten frustrated instead of -- I mean I had a good opportunity to still make par and that's what have you to do. You just have to roll with the punches. You get yourself in trouble and hopefully you will get yourself out.

I wouldn't say that I think that I would have had a melt down. I don't think that would have occurred on 13, I think that would have occurred on the first tee.

So to hold myself in there on, you know, make a good par on one, make a good up and down on one, for me that was kind of -- it felt good. You know, a good 2-putt on No. 2 after hitting a crutty wedge in there.

Even 3, I hit what I thought was as good as a chip as I could hit and unfortunately I just shortsighted myself, I told myself to keep going there is a lot of birdie opportunities out there, I'm playing well and putting well, so hopefully something will happen.

Unfortunately I was in between all friggin' day long.

Q. (Inaudible)?

JILL MCGILL: Well, my pants were falling down all day. Other than that, no, not really. All I was concerned with was not having something showing.

(Laughter). No, no, I'm not 16 and I shouldn't be wearing the low riders on the golf course, and I had to keep on pulling them up. You think I'm kidding, the creek on 13 felt really, really good. I told Kay, if I didn't know any better, I would have taken a swim in there. It was really, really hot. It was definitely hot. You had to drink a lot of fluids and just keep your energy up.

Q. (Inaudible)?

JILL MCGILL: That's about all I have had. So maybe it won't be as humid.

Q. (Inaudible)?

JILL MCGILL: Chicago, this year, I think. Was I second? I don't know. I had a good chance at it. Well, I didn't finish second. I don't know. To tell you the truth, I don't remember. It wasn't very memorable.

Q. (Inaudible)?

JILL MCGILL: Well, Leta Lindley and I have had some nasty games of backgammon going on. That would be good. I like watching the Olympics. I fully intend of going home, having dinner and washing it down with ice cream, like I do every night. That's about it. Just I haven't been dwelling on it. I haven't been thinking about it. I have been leaving it at the golf course and going forward. That's going to be a huge key for me.

JILL MCGILL: It's very competitive. It's just like any other office job. You're definitely going to have your better friends. It's just like any office. You are acquaintances with everybody. You are friendly with everybody. You respect everybody. You are closer with some other people than you are to others. Kim Saiki won earlier this year, and I couldn't have been happier for her. She has been out here a long time. She is doing the same thing.
