AN INTERVIEW WITH PAULA CREAMER

**PAULA CREAMER:** I didn't look at the scoreboard on 16. I didn't look at that. Walking up to 18, I saw that Natalie birdied, and then I knew that I had to par or make birdie to get it, and so I knew, but I really wasn't trying to pay attention out there too much today.

Q. Did it change the way you played 18?

**PAULA CREAMER:** No, it didn't. I knew I had a little adrenalin. I knew more of my line off the tee, if anything, because I was pumped up and it was downwind. It didn't really do too much. I knew I couldn't make bogey and par and be in the playoff.

Q. What was the shot that up here --

**PAULA CREAMER:** I hit a 6-iron. I had 170 to the pin. Hit it about four feet.

Q. How difficult is it to study, analyze, memorize every scoreboard that you go by all day?

**PAULA CREAMER:** I talking with my dad. He was, don't get too wrapped up, and go out and play your game. The last couple of holes, you want to know where you are at, but at the same time, you might get a little too anxious. Honestly, I had a lot of fun out there. I wasn't hitting very good, but I was getting away with shots, and I was enjoying myself and I tried not to look at the board.

Q. We talked about the scoreboard all week, but when you are out there and it gets this close, do you find yourself fixating on that scoreboard?

**PAULA CREAMER:** No, not today, no. Today was more, just get yourself in. Once you get yourself in, then you can think about it. But overall, it's going to be an exciting Sunday.

Q. (Inaudible)?

**PAULA CREAMER:** Oh, I'm very excited to be there. I think it's important to have America there. At the same time, it's international too. You have a little bit of everything

going on. That's pretty neat for the LPGA Tour.

Q. Are you glad you have no grounds and make up tomorrow?

**PAULA CREAMER:** Absolutely. You go out and play good. I'll definitely be at the driving range this afternoon and hit some balls.

Q. (Inaudible) Do you wait to see what the other players are doing?

**PAULA CREAMER:** Just going to try. Honestly, if I have a shot, I'm going to take it. Just try and stay patient, but at the same time be a little aggressive when it's necessary. I have pins that I can be aggressive at. It's going to be difficult tomorrow. It's not going to be easy, and hopefully it blows hard. That's what I would like, when it's really windy.

Q. If there are only four groups -- maybe not -- is there going to be a significant advantage to be last, or is the adrenaline (Inaudible)?

**PAULA CREAMER:** I think it's because everybody is go close together, it's not going to matter. You can start off in the first couple of groups and post a low number, but at same time you can finish really good. So the middle would be nice. It would be ideal. But whatever you have to do, you have to go out there and play your game.

Q. It's the final round, in a way it's in every round. Do you use a different strategy going in? Is your game plan the same as normally it is in the final round? Do you think you'll change strategies quickly since it's an all-or-nothing thing?

**PAULA CREAMER:** No, I'm just going to go out and play the way I've played the last couple of days. Today I had a couple of shots that day that I could have been aggressive with, and I was, and maybe tomorrow I might not feel it. You can't get too wrapped up with what's going on. You have to believe in yourself and know your confidence and that you can do it.
